

Neil Sedaka


The history of Rock N' Roll would be incomplete without the innumerable contributions of Neil Sedaka. For over fifty years, Neil has written, performed, produced, and inspired countless songs, and his canon of compositions will continue to stand the test of time.

Early in his career, Sedaka recorded chart toppers "The Diary," "Oh! Carol," "Stairway to Heaven," "Calendar Girl," "Little Devil," "Happy Birthday Sweet Sixteen," "Next Door To An Angel," and "Breaking Up Is Hard To Do," songs that have become a part of people's lives and can instantly take listeners back to special moments. As a songwriter, he's written for such artists including Frank Sinatra, Elvis Presley, Tom Jones, and The Fifth Dimension.

In 1975 he was back on top with "Bad Blood" and the quintessential "Laughter in the Rain," both reaching the #1 position on the music charts.

With a career spanning six decades, a rare feat in the entertainment world, Sedaka never ceases to amaze. He shows no signs of slowing down and we're thrilled to have him performing for Utah's local officials.


