


It's an exciting time to be part of local government in Utah. We hope this conference invigorates you and helps you take on the challenges and opportunities that are ahead.



Historically, cities wait until their road system has failed before they begin budgeting for repairs. This approach costs 5 to 10 times that of good pavement preservation practices applied consistently through the life of the system. Proper timing of cost effective treatments is crucial to a city's financial health.

Sales tax revenue, the largest municipal revenue source, has declined in 21 of the last 22 months for Utah's cities and towns (double digit drops in at least 9 of those months). In addition, motor fuel tax, another important municipal revenue source, dropped 8.7% in FY2009 and is flat so far through FY2010. The Great Recession has definitely taken a large bite out of municipal revenue, leaving city managers and elected officials with very difficult budget decisions. The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) provides a list of potential practices to offer "fiscal first aid" to ailing budgets. This workshop, through a panel discussion, will review and debate these first aid budget best practices. What strategies work well? What are the long-term consequences to certain budget cuts? Which budget strategies should be utilized with caution or extreme caution?


