 - 1000s of emails from special interest groups so use your relationships!


- Social media engagement

Housing/land use bills

- HB 462 Utah Housing Affordability Amendments (Waldrip)
 - Karson memo
- Station Area Plans (Waldrip)
 - Will be merged into HB 462
- Land Use Task Force consensus bill (Waldrip)
 - *Now HB 303 (V. Peterson)
- Potential other land use preemption bills (lots of moving parts)
 - State spot zoning
 - State mandated minimum density

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
Single-Family Detached & Multifamily Residential Permits Authorized in Utah

HB 462 – Utah Housing Affordability Amendments

MIHP & Reporting Changes

- Modifies MIHP 'menu' item language and adds new items.
 - Adds "missing middle housing" as a menu item
- Requires implementation element for menu items.
- Changes reporting requirement from December to October 1 to better align with municipal fiscal year.
- 2022 report: updated MIHP items
- 2023 and future reports: updated MIHP items + descriptions of implementation steps, barriers, private sector responses, ADU numbers, and recommendations for how the state can support the municipality
- Min. 3 menu items for cities without fixed transit, 5 menu items for cities with fixed transit.
 - Eligibility for TIF, TTIF, GOPB ARPA Local Matching Grant
- Prioritization for cities that go above and beyond min strategy adoption.
 - Prioritization for TIF, TTIF projects and ARPA Local Matching Grant

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HB 462 – Utah Housing Affordability Amendments

Other provisions

- IADU safe harbor provisions
 - Anticipated substitute restores HB 82 provisions, will create a temporary safe harbor provision from applicable building/health codes for IADUs created before 10/1/2021. Cities can still:
 - require smoke/carbon monoxide detectors,
 - require egress (consistent with HB 82 limitations)
 - refuse to issue a license/permit for an IADU with
- Point of the Mountain Land Authority inclusionary housing requirements
 - 10% total units reserved for households earning <50% AMI
 - 10% total units reserved for households earning <80% AMI
- Olene Walker Board Changes
- Creates rural housing fund
- Modifies granting property for affordable housing
- Technical corrections



HB 462 – Utah Housing Affordability Amendments

Appropriations

- \$500,000 to DWS for moderate income housing database
- \$750,000 to DWS for two years of landlord assistance program
- \$50,000,000 to DWS for multifamily housing private activity bonds
- \$382,000 to DWS for additional staff/administration
- \$250,000 for land use/housing training workshops
- \$250,000 to a nonprofit entity that engages in efforts to increase housing affordability
- \$50,000,000 to rural housing loan fund
- \$3,000,000 to GOEO for statewide marketing and outreach campaign

Station Area Plans (SAP) HB 462

- All cities w/FR, TRAX, or BRT (or bus hub outside of UTA) must do a SAP
 - 1) May use existing transit-oriented plans (e.g. Cairns in Sandy)
 - 2) ½ mile radius for FR & TRAX (66 stations)
- 2) Cities must update general plan & zoning to implement SAP in aggressive but doable time frame
 - 1) Exact time frame still being finalized
- 3) State objectives for SAP
 - 1) Housing affordability and availability
 - 2) Sustainable environmental conditions
 - 3) Access to opportunities
 - 4) Transportation choices/connectivity

4) SAP implementation

- 1) Stakeholder engagement
- 2) Current and future land use opportunities
- Current conditions/impediments to development
- 5) Incorporate SAP into SB 34+ review and req'ts
 - 1) City plans and adopts
 - 2) MPO review to confirm state objectives are met
 - 3) Mandatory menu item under SB 34+ with DWS confirmation
- 6) Incentives for cities that adopt SAPs
- 7) Increase referendum standards for SAPs and related legislative acts (i.e. zoning)
- 8) State and MPO technical assistance to do SAPs

Other land use bills: HB 303, HB 416

HB 303 original (opposed)

HB 303 1st sub (new position: neutral)

- Enhanced notice bill around modification of text of zoning code to help a lay person understand
- 2) HB 303 2nd Sub
 - 1) Incorporates Land Use Task Force bill (HB 474)
 - 2) Negotiated provision on inclusionary housing

HB 416 (opposed)

- 1) Authorizes Office of Property Rights
 Ombudsman (OPRO) to review ALL local
 land use ordinances, decisions, policy,
 emails, etc. and report on them
- 2) Authorizes OPRO to receive third party requests for advisory opinions to determine if a local land use ordinance is inconsistent with state law
- 3) Authorizes the justification of attorney fees to a third party if city does not cure ordinance

HB 440 – Homeless Service Amendments (Position Pending)

\$5,000,000 ongoing in the budget

-Passed the House, Now in Senate
